The fundraising event you won't want to miss

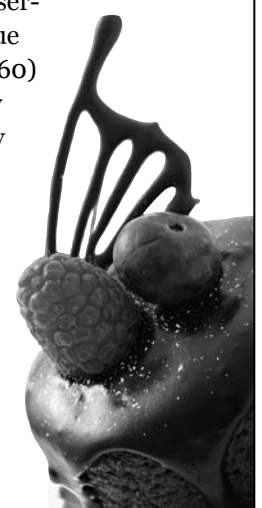

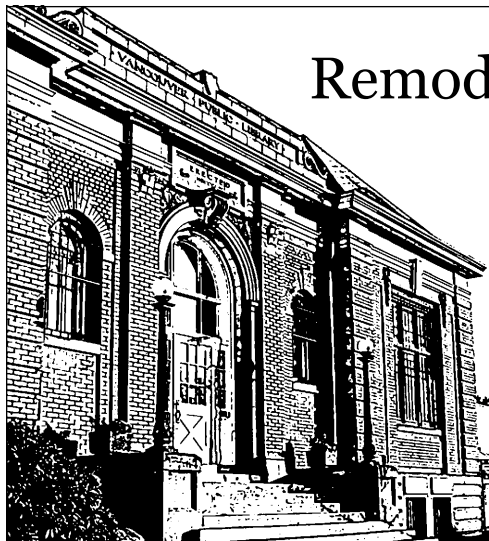

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## Remodeling project levels exhibit



Early in February, visitors to the museum had to cover their ears and steer clear of debris as employees of the City of Vancouver's Facilities and Operations department demolished the remains of the old Country Store exhibit (pictured on the right) in the northwest corner of the museum. The Country Store exhibit featured the Store itself – including the original Post Office boxes from the Heisson Store – as well as a model kitchen and a doctor's office filled with instruments, tinctures, an old patient record ledger, and various medical contrivances. All of these artifacts were safely packed away by industrious museum volunteers prior to the demolition.

The February 9 dismantling of the circa-1964 exhibit opened up the north wing to reveal the original architecture of the 1909 Carnegie Library. The newly cleared space will be used as a multi-purpose gallery for exhibits and also for hosting lectures and workshops. Clark County Architect (and

CCHS member) Eric Lanciault generously donated his time to assist the museum with the project. Lanciault is working with the museum on plans to further restore the building.



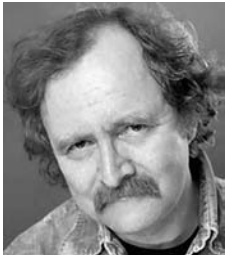
## 2010 Richard A. Anderson Memorial History Day Award

On February 27 retired teacher and community volunteer Terry Ogle took executive director Susan Tissot's place at the annual Regional History Day Award ceremony at Washington State University Vancouver campus to announce the 2010 recipients for the museum's Richard A. Anderson Memorial History Day Scholarship Award. Since 2007, the annual award has been given to one Clark County student who demonstrates the highest academic scholarship, understands the connection between the past and the present, and most clearly expresses the National History Day theme for that year. A second award was created in 2008 to recognize one Clark County educator who best exemplifies the

highest level of National History Day Leadership. The cash award is given to help offset the student and teacher's expenses when attending the state level competition. And the winners are...Wy'East Middle School Teacher Michelle Annette and student Maggie Altenhof-Long (pictured below).

## CCHM acquires Brautigan Library Collection

Following two years of negotiation, the *Brautigan Library* of unpublished manuscripts will come full circle this fall as it is relocated to the Clark County Historical Museum. The Library is named after author and poet Richard Brautigan (pictured above), who was born in Tacoma, Washington in 1935. The original Brautigan Library – original being a bit of a misnomer, since it was more ethereal than real – was in fact a purely fictional library in Brautigan's 1971 novel *The Abortion: An Historical Romance 1966*. In *The Abortion*, Brautigan describes what proves to be the Presidio branch of the San Francisco Carnegie Library as the welcoming home for the unpublished but beloved manuscripts of ordinary San Franciscans. The library lived only between the pages of this book until 1990, when Vermont writer Todd Lockwood opened The Brautigan Library in Burlington, Vermont. A few years later, the collection was moved to the Fletcher Free Library and remained there until 2005. Since then, the collection of manuscripts has been in storage. Soon, however, the Library will return to the West Coast, the place of its conception, and be incorporated into the museum's permanent collection.

The Library itself contains over 300 unpublished manuscripts written by everyday authors. Thanks to a partnership between the museum, Dr. John Barber, and the Digital Technology and Culture Program at Washington State University Vancouver the museum will expand the collection over time in the form of digital manuscripts. In keeping with the spirit of the original (fictional) Library, anyone will be able to submit their unpublished writing to the library, as well as read the manuscripts. By reopening the library, the museum will be able to continue its mission of connecting writers and readers of personal narratives.

According to Barber, "The Brautigan Library is not about publishing, or even literature. It's about people telling their stories in a democratic way. It is a very public home for personal narratives in a digital age." Barber, a leading Brautigan scholar, is the developer and curator of the Brautigan Bibliography and Archive ([www.brautigan.net](http://www.brautigan.net)), an interactive, online resource generally acknowledged as the premier information source for the life and works of Richard Brautigan.

"There is international interest in The Brautigan Library, both as a historical idea and an attraction for Vancouver," said Barber. "We are planning research activities, conferences, exhibits and creative activities as part of the community outreach focus of our partnership with the Clark County Historical Museum."

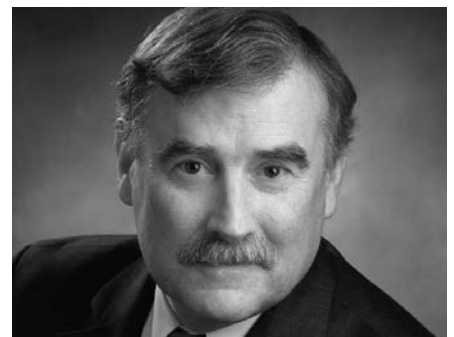
This idea ties nicely with the mission of the Museum, according to CCHS executive director Susan Tissot. "This is a very exciting addition to our permanent collections in that it highlights our mission of collecting, preserving and interpreting the culture and history of the Pacific Northwest, along with providing educational opportunities for the public. Richard Brautigan is a native son, a rather famous one, and we look forward to promoting his vision for a very public library through this interactive partnership with the DTC Program at WSU Vancouver."

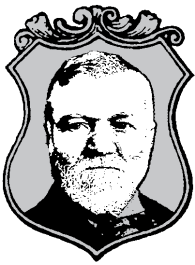

# Mr. Carnegie's Grand Tour of Washington

On Friday, February 12, Executive Director of the CCHS Susan Tissot presented 2009 Carnegie passport

drawing winner Colette Peasley with a basket of Washington-made products from around the state. Partners from the museum's state-wide initiative, the Carnegie Library Consortium of Washington (CLCW) contributed books on local history, vouchers, sports paraphernalia, and an assortment of edible treats to create the year end prize. Ms. Peasley was one of about thirty state-wide contestants to send in their stamped passports for the year end drawing. The award of the basket markets the completion of the first year of the annual program. Mr. Carnegie's Grand Tour of Washington and associated educational materials were created by the Clark County Historical Museum in 2009 in honor of the museum's double anniversary celebration (the Vancouver

Carnegie Library's hundredth birthday and the museum's forty-fifth). The tour is designed to draw attention to the Carnegie Library buildings in Washington State. What becomes clear to those who take the tour is the variety of architectural styles used. Despite regional peculiarities, two structural ingredients are found throughout: a grand front staircase, symbolizing the intellectual elevation gained through learning, and a lamp-post, representing enlightenment.

This pattern of the shared and

the unique is mirrored in Carnegie's manner of philanthropy, as well. He is known for his espousal of "helping those who help themselves"; when funding libraries, he would stipulate that the community do its share: they had to demonstrate a need for the library, provide a building site, and raise operation funds annually to equal 10% of the original construction cost.

While Carnegie funded 43 libraries in the state, ten of those have since been razed. While some of the remaining buildings still house public libraries, many others are home to museums, art centers and private businesses.

For those who did not get a chance to take Mr. Carnegie's tour last year, do not lose hope: the CLCW plans to continue the passport program, so come in today to pick up your free copy. The passports and Andy the Library Explorer program are also posted on the museum's website. Keep an eye out for the new passports, which will be coming out later this year and will include an updated list of participating Carnegie Libraries.

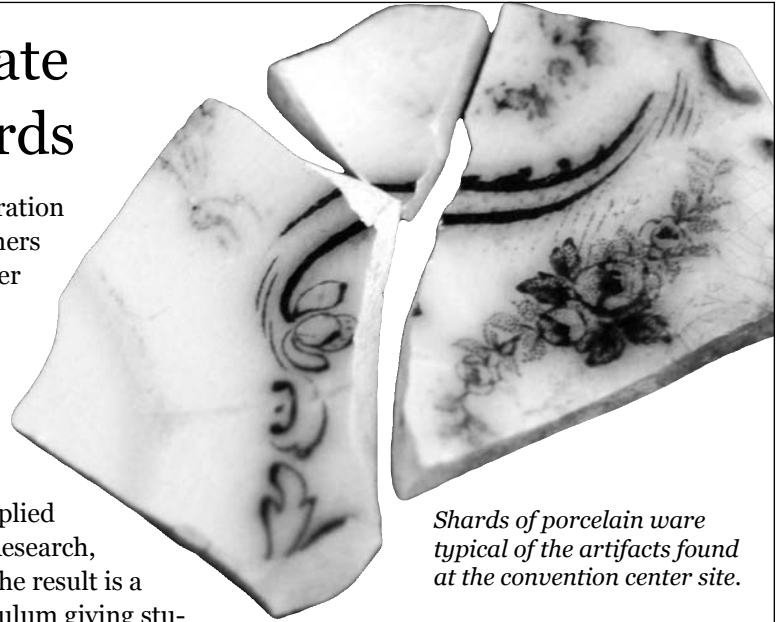
# Museum programs win State Historic Preservation awards

The CCHM has been named as a double recipient of the Washington State Historic Preservation Officer's Awards for *Outstanding Achievement in Historic Preservation*. The awards program, in its 20th year, recognizes persons, organizations, and projects that have achieved distinction in the field of historic preservation. This year 13 awards will be given; two of which go to the CCHM.

In the category for Outstanding Achievement in Preservation Education the two awards made in this category are based on projects spearheaded by the CCHM. The first preservation education effort is the *Artifacts Detectives program* developed by Executive Director Susan

Tissot in collaboration with school teachers Janet Dondelinger (Pioneer Elementary), Tyler Morgan (Camas High School) and archaeologist Jessica Hale (Applied Archaeological Research, Portland, OR). The result is a classroom curriculum giving students and teachers keen insights into life in early 20th century Vancouver. The "hands-on" experience uses historical artifacts unearthed prior to construction of the city's downtown convention center. For a glimpse at the project at work in the classroom visit the museum's website to view the YouTube posting of the project.

In its second award winning effort, the CCHM spearheaded the Carnegie Library Consortium of Washington and developed a passport styled program to acquaint families with Washington's historic Carnegie Libraries. Launched as *Mr. Carnegie's Grand Tour of Washington*, the museum crafted a website, children's story book, maps, research tools, and a statewide tour that teaches about Andrew Carnegie and the local libraries he established. The clever passport program was designed by graphic artist Jane Leonard and former Visitor



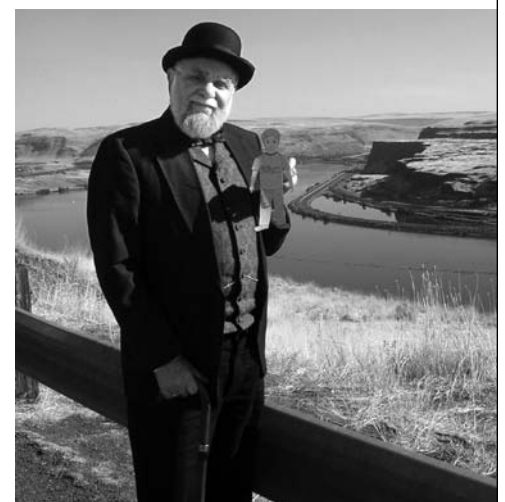

Services Coordinator Lisa Christopher to encourage visits to participating Carnegie Libraries around the state.

Award recipients will be recognized during a special ceremony held on May 4, 2010 in the Legislative Building on the historic State Capitol Campus. State Historic Preservation Officer, Dr. Allyson Brooks will preside over the awards ceremony. The awards coincide with National Historic Preservation Month, an annual celebration occurring every May.
